


The greenhouses are still under renovation and we are expecting them to be finished by the Autumn which will give us much more room for planting and propagating.



CURIOUS INCIDENT OF DOG IN THE NIGHT-TIME

Selected National Theatre Live venues will be holding relaxed screenings of *The Curious Incident of the Dog in the Night-Time* during June (dates vary between venues). Based on the acclaimed novel, *The Curious Incident of the Dog in the Night-Time* has been hailed by *The Times* as 'a phenomenal combination of storytelling and spectacle'. Relaxed screenings are specially designed to welcome people with an autism spectrum condition, sensory or communication disorder or learning disability into the cinema. They give those, who otherwise might feel excluded, the chance to experience a National Theatre Live broadcast. They have a less formal, more supportive atmosphere to reduce anxiety levels. There is a relaxed




attitude to audience noise and movement and some small changes made to the light and sound levels. MATILDA THE MUSICAL

The Royal Shakespeare Company will be presenting a 'relaxed performance' of Matilda The Musical at the Cambridge Theatre on Sunday 15 June at 3pm.

The National Autistic Society is working closely with the RSC on this special performance offering full access to the theatre for people with autism and learning disabilities. This first relaxed performance of



Matilda The Musical builds on the programme of 'relaxed' performances that the RSC has been running in Stratford-upon-Avon since 2013, when it was amongst the first to adopt and promote the concept. The performance will provide a relaxed environment, with elements of the production adapted to reduce anxiety or stress.

Lighting and sound levels will be adjusted to soften their impact and there will be a relaxed attitude to noise and moving around the auditorium during the performance. Designated 'chill-out' areas will be provided outside the auditorium with soft seating and activities for people to use if being in the auditorium becomes overwhelming for them.

The Royal Shakespeare Company will offer tickets for this performance at the reduced rate of £20, booked through the RSC ticket hotline or in person at the box office. All bookers will be sent a visual story to help them familiarise themselves with the plot, characters and the setting before they arrive at the theatre. NEWS FROM ROYAL MENCAP

RAISING FUNDS WITH COMPUTER RECYCLING

Tackling the growing problem of electronic waste is the focus of a new scheme helping to raise funds to support people with a learning disability. The new partnership between The Royal Mencap Society and the computer recycling company RDC means a percentage of funds will be raised for Mencap each time someone donates their old IT equipment to be recycled. Around 50 million tonnes of toxic electronic waste is generated globally each year but only 12.5% of it is recycled, with old computers making up the bulk of the unwanted items put into landfill sites. Richard Yorke, director of fundraising at Mencap says: "The partnership with RDC will provide an excellent opportunity for people to raise funds for Mencap while combating a worrying threat to the global environment. RDC's donations to Mencap for the old IT equipment they receive from us will help fund our campaigns which have won many victories for people with a learning disability, and also fund our helpline which offers advice and support to people with a learning disability, their families and carers.

COMPLAIN FOR CHANGE CAMPAIGN



Mencap supports a campaign to improve health services for people with a learning disability by making it easier to complain. Too many people with a learning disability are not getting access to the right care and treatment at the right time, leading to avoidable deaths, warns the Parliamentary and Health Service Ombudsman (PHSO). One of the biggest barriers to achieving good care for people with a learning disability was an overall lack of understanding of their needs, according to the Health Ombudsman Service's recent investigations. The Complain for Change campaign aims to make change in health services by showing how making a complaint can make a real difference and sometimes prevent avoidable deaths of people

with a learning disability. Mencap's Death by Indifference campaign has highlighted several cases of poor treatment that led to the unnecessary deaths of people with a learning disability. The Ombudsman's investigations also found alarming gaps in care provided for people with a learning disability, meaning that vital opportunities to prevent their deaths were missed. These included cases where: the patient's condition was not diagnosed quickly enough; proper checks to assess their initial condition were not made; and a patient was deemed too "difficult to assess" meaning their symptoms went unnoticed until it was too late.

Mencap's research found that 75% of GPs have received no training to help them to treat people with a learning disability. It also showed that of 900,000 people with a learning disability in England, only 200,000 are registered with their GPs as having a learning disability. Being registered as having a learning disability with a GP means that the patient will benefit from an annual health check, which can often uncover treatable conditions. Marking the first time that simple and accessible information has been provided for people with a learning disability in GP surgeries on how to make a complaint, the Complain for Change campaign will be promoted in hundreds of GP surgeries across London and nationally with patient advocacy groups, Healthwatch and the local NHS. Research showed that people with a learning disability are one of the groups least likely to raise a complaint with the PHSO. The campaign is part of PHSO's work to make it easier for people with a learning disability to complain.

BETTER ACCESS FOR VOTING

Parliamentary Committee hears that voting needs to be made accessible for people with a learning disability. Mencap spokesperson and Parliamentary affairs assistant Ismail Kaji told a Select Committee of MPs that work needs to be done to encourage and support people with a learning disability to vote in the 2015 general election. Ismail gave evidence to the Political and Constitutional Reform Committee in their inquiry into voter engagement, in what is believed to be the first time someone with a learning disability has given evidence in this way in this Parliament.



Many people with a learning disability face barriers engaging with the democratic process and voting. Less than a third (31%) said that they voted in the 2001 general election - much lower than the population as a whole (59%). Unfortunately, many people with a learning disability don't see the point in registering to vote. They don't think voting will affect their lives or make any difference. "This is bad because many decisions made by Parliament have a huge impact on them like cuts to social care and benefits," says Ismail Kaji. Graham Allen MP, Chair of the Committee says: "One of the reasons is a culture of inaccessible politics. Mencap is calling for parties to consider communicating in a clearer, jargon-free way, which will be more easily understood by people with a learning disability and their families. It is a basic democratic principle that all citizens are able to participate on an equal basis, and people must not be disenfranchised as a result of having a learning disability."

ALARMING FIGURES ABOUT ABUSE

New figures from the Learning Disability Census 2013 show that people with a learning disability in inpatient units are at high risk of abusive and restrictive practices Of the 3,250 people with a learning disability in units:

56% had experienced self-harm, an accident, physical assault, hands—on restraint or been kept in isolation during the 3 months preceding the census

64% had been given anti-psychotic medication on a regular basis leading up to census day 60% have been there one year or more

71% don't have a plan for their move back to the community.

Despite the scandal at Winterbourne View, the new report shows that in the last 3 years there has been no real reduction in concerning incidents in similar places and the percentages of people experiencing self-harm, hands-on restraint and being kept in isolation are higher. 2,297 of people in these settings have no plan to move out, and recent NHS England data shows the numbers going into these places is twice the number coming out.

Jan Tregelles, Chief Executive of Mencap, and Vivien Cooper, Chief Executive of The Challenging Behaviour Foundation, commented: "We were told that two and half years on from the Winterbourne View scandal, 3,250 people with a learning disability were still stuck in similar institutions. This was shocking enough, but what we have heard today about the actual circumstances of these individuals is profoundly worrying. That some of the most vulnerable people in our society are in settings where they are regularly restrained, over medicated and kept in isolation is utterly disgraceful. In addition, the fact that this appalling 'care' is costing the public purse, in many cases, up to £4,500 per week demands that urgent questions are asked and answers provided. It is not enough for the government to say it should not be happening. It is happening to people's sons and daughters, brothers and sisters and, what's more, people are continuing to go into these places faster than they are coming out. The lack of urgency and action to stop this happening is a disgrace. We demand that the government takes urgent action and we expect to see immediate and real progress."

FANCY PLAYING DARTS FOR US?

Teams are needed for Kingston Mencap's fundraising darts marathon. All you need is six people - you don't need to be great at darts, just enthusiastic and able to play constantly for two 1 hour turns. We have several of Kingston pubs who are keen to host an evening of charity darts. We will provide the scorers and a time-keeper to help you along and make sure all the teams stick to the rules. The evenings are great fun and help to raise funds for Kingston Mencap, we are keen to include teams without a particular connection to Kingston Mencap as well as ones including members to try to spread the word about the great work we do and get more community involvement in Kingston Mencap.

If you have a team of six and want to know more please get in touch and well send you the rules, sponsor forms and sort out a suitable venue (pub!). If you can't make a whole team don't worry, let us know how many you number and we'll put teams of six together with all those who are keen to take part. I've helped to run this kind of event before and found that it gathers momentum over time as more teams are keen to join in. 



LEARNING DISABILITY SERVICE UPDATE

The work to transfer Kingston Learning Disability Provider Services to Balance, a social enterprise organisation, is well underway. The services that are currently run by the Council and will be transferring to Balance are Woodbury Residential Care & Respite Service, Kingston Supported Living Service and the Work Activities & Transport Service (including Stud Nursery, Victoria Park Cafe, the Sandwich Business and Gardening Group).



- All permanent staff working in the services will be transferring to Balance on the same terms and conditions
- All office staff will continue to be based at Sessions House People being supported by the services will keep going to the same places and will get the same level of support
- The Council will continue to be responsible for monitoring the quality of the services when they have transferred to Balance.

There will be a five year contract for Woodbury and the Respite Service, with an opportunity to extend the contract at the end of the five years. Kingston Supported Living Service and the Work Activities and Transport Service will continue to be funded on an individual basis through Personal Budgets or council managed services. Over the last two months, managers from the Learning Disability Service and Andrea Biggs and Doug Creswell from Balance have been meeting with staff, people supported by the services and family members and carers.

The aim is that the services and staff will be managed by Balance from 1st July 2014. This is subject to the legal contracts being agreed and signed, so we will write to everyone nearer the time to confirm the date. A project team including colleagues from HR, finance, legal and the learning disability service and Balance are working together to ensure there is minimal disruption to services during the process. We believe this is a positive step for the services involved and are looking forward to working with Balance to ensure the services continue to develop. LEARNING DISABILITY PARLIAMENT


The Parliament has been looking ahead and making plans for the future. The Parliament wants to become more user-led, reach out to more people and keep working on the things that matter to people with learning disabilities in Kingston like Health, Employment, Transport, and Friendships. The MPs stood down in March at the end of their three years in post. Instead of elections this year, paid jobs called Peer Advocates have been created on the Parliament for people with learning disabilities. The role of a Peer Advocate is to support other people with learning disabilities to speak up and make sure their views are heard. A Peer Advocate is someone who may have experienced similar issues and can use that experience to support others. People who are interested in the job must apply by Friday 6th June. There will be interviews after this and then we will let everyone know the names of the successful applicants There will also be more opportunities for people to do Project Work. Project Workers get paid expenses for their time.

Nicole Marcangelo (pictured right) has been recruited to the role of Learning Disability Co-ordinator. Nicole started in May and her job includes managing the Parliament team and the Reception Team at Sessions House. Nicole will also be working on Pinboard and the learning disability website. Parliament are also very pleased to be working in partnership with Healthwatch to make sure health and social care services are good quality.
